The South Asian Network for Development and Environmental Economics (SANDEE) is a new network that hopes to bring together analysts from the different countries in South Asia to address environment-development problems. SANDEE's mission is to strengthen the capacity of individuals and institutions in South Asia to undertake research on the inter-linkages between economic development and environmental change and to disseminate practical information that can be applied to development policies.

INAUGURAL MEETING - PROCEEDINGS

SANDEE was inaugurated in November 1999 in Kathmandu. Over 60 scholars from ten countries, including Pakistan, Nepal, Bangladesh, Sri Lanka and India, attended the inaugural. The meeting was used to exchange information about research and to develop a blueprint for SANDEE's future activities.
